From Our Mayor...

I hope everybody survived this winter - the worst in 30 years.

Most residents aren't aware that, in Warren, there are 120 miles of roads that the Township needs to keep clear every winter with plowing, sanding and salting. Our DPW crews usually begin their plowing routes while the rest of us are asleep and the six storms we have had thus far in 2011 have pressed their resources to the maximum. Yet, I have heard nothing but compliments from our residents for the outstanding way our DPW crews have handled this challenge.

Now that Spring is here a new challenge awaits – POTHOLE! The road damage this year was very bad but despite economic constraints the Township is determined to continue to maintain our infrastructure as this is critical to the safety and well-being of Warren's residents. Our objective is to continue our extensive road resurfacing program at its present level of funding.

The Township Committee is committed to meet Governor Christie's requirements to not to exceed the tax levy cap and property taxes and has been meeting with a number of stakeholders to achieve this. Members of the Boards of Education have met with us to coordinate the budget process to meet this goal and, this year, the Sewage Authority was able to reduce the usage fee charged our residents.

While we have one of the best police departments in the State, Warren Township has reduced its officer headcount from 30 to 28 due to budget constraints and our PBA organization and Chief Russ Leffert have been critical in making this work with minimum disruption in police services. Under the leadership of Committeeman Victor Sordillo, the Township Committee is actively participating in the Somerset County Police Force Consolidation Task Force to insure that this effort meets the needs of Warren and its residents.

But not everything this year has to do with budgets and the tough financial conditions municipalities face! In February the Recreation Commission, all volunteers, sponsored a very successful Bon Fire event and over 500 residents attended. This same Commission is hard at work preparing programs for the Spring and Summer season, including the Summer Camp Program. Green Team members have a broad knowledge ranging from electric vehicles to green building to organic gardening. The mission of Warren's Green Team is to be a resource for the residents of Warren in communicating Sustainable practices and creating programs that enhance quality of life through conservation and environmental management. Please mail in sufficient time to insure that it is received prior to the end of the grace period. Interest is 8% on the first \$1,500 delinquent and 18% for delinquencies exceeding \$1,500. A 6% year end penalty is issued on delinquent taxes over \$10,000.

RABIES CLINIC

All residents are encouraged to have their dog or cat vaccinated against rabies. Spring is upon us and we can expect to see a restart of activity in our local wildlife. Along with this activity comes the increased risk of exposure to rabies. If your pet has been previously vaccinated the health department recommends that your dog or cat be vaccinated every other year. If your pet has not been vaccinated against rabies now is the time. The clinic is free to all.

April 4 – 10, 2011



For more than a decade, communities across the country have celebrated National Public Health Week (NPHW) each April by highlighting public health achievements and raising awareness of issues important to improving the public's health. This year National Public Health Week, sponsored by the American Public Health Association, will continue its broad vision to make America the healthiest nation in one generation by addressing the importance of injury and violence prevention through the theme "**Safety is No Accident: Live Injury-free**".

Injuries are not "accidents", and we can prevent them from happening. Taking actions such as wearing a seatbelt, properly installing and using child safety seats, wearing a helmet and storing cleaning supplies in locked cabinets are important ways to proactively promote safety and prevent injuries.

WEST NILE VIRUS

With summer approaching we must be ready for West Nile Virus (WNV). West Nile Virus is transmitted through the bite of an infected mosquito. The virus cannot be transmitted from human to human or bird to human. The symptoms of WNV may include no symptoms at all to a mild fever, headache, body aches, skin rashes, and swollen glands. There is no specific treatment for WNV, however most people recover within two weeks.

To reduce your risk of being bitten by a mosquito the following precautions should be taken: spray insect repellent on clothing and exposed skin according to manufacturers instructions, wear long sleeve shirts and pants when outdoors, and limit outdoor activities when mosquitoes are most active, at dawn, dusk and evenings.

Potholes, That Dirty Little Springtime Word

Not being lucky enough to spend the winter in one of those states which end in Carolina, I'm confident that I'm not alone in feeling that this was a long winter, extremely long.

As some welcome relief came along a week or so ago in the form of 55-60 degree days, I took genuine pleasure in being able to drive down the road with my windows half down soaking in the beginning of spring's aromas. All felt right in the world until complacency led me to make contact with one of spring's true adversaries, the insidious Warren Township pothole. Now it's not that we have the market cornered on potholes, it's just that with almost 120 miles of Township Roads, we certainly have the potential for lots of them.

Unfortunately, many people have limited knowledge on how potholes are formed. Needing someone to blame, they misguide their anger and find fault with the people who work and repair the roads. Nothing could be further from the truth. The one truly responsible for the creation of these menacing little creatures is Mother Nature. All you need to make an enormous pothole is snow piles, sunny days and cold nights. Regrettably for us, we've had all three all winter long. As daytime sun melts the snow, water seeps into cracks in the pavement. Overnight the water freezes and heaves the pavement out in sections

The question is not "if" we will have potholes this spring, but where they will be and what you can do to navigate through them safely. Here are some tips.

- Be observant, keep your eyes on the road and drive in a manner which enables you to anticipate and react to any potholes you may come upon.
- Drive cautiously and try to anticipate the actions of other drivers, joggers and bicyclers who also may have to avoid potholes they encounter.
- Expect the unexpected. Our excellent Public Works department is already out in force making the necessary roadway repairs. You may encounter workers in the roadway at anytime so please drive with enough caution to keep them safe.

SLEEPOVER CHECKLIST

A checklist to help parents and caregivers consider hazards and make decisions about slumber parties and sleepovers.

Before you permit your child to sleep over with a friend, talk to the child's parents. Depending on what you learn, it can either uncover serious fire dangers or give you peace of mind during your child's sleepover.

Before you say "yes"

- How well do you know the home?
- Is the home clean? Does it appear to be structurally sound?
- Is the home in a safe area?
- If the home has security bars on doors and windows, do you know for certain that the bars have quick release devices inside, so your child could get out in an emergency?
- Is your child comfortable in the home and with all the occupants?
- Are you comfortable leaving your child in the home overnight?

How well do you know the parent(s)?

- Are they mature, responsible and conscientious?
- Will they supervise the children throughout the stay?
- Are they cautious with smoking materials, matches and lighters, and candles?

Ask the parents

- Are there working smoke alarms on every level, inside and outside each sleeping area? Are the alarms interconnected?
- Do they have a well-rehearsed fire escape plan that includes two ways out and a meeting place outside?
- Where will your child be sleeping? Is there a smoke alarm in the room? Are there two escape routes from the room?
- Will the parents walk through their escape plan with your child?
- Do the parents prohibit bedroom candle use by children?

HOME REHABILITATION PROGRAM

The Warren Township Committee offers a Housing Rehabilitation Program for residents who meet Council on Affordable Housing (COAH) regulations for low and moderate incomes.

The program provides up to \$15,000 per dwelling for home improvements such as: new roof, electrical improvements, smoke detectors, etc. The funds are in the form of an interest free loan which is forgiven after a 10 year period. The loan must be repaid only if the property is sold within the 10 year period. Interested residents can contact *Rehabco, Inc.*, at (732) 477-7750 in Brick, New Jersey or the Township Administrator's office at x252. The Township has been successful in rehabilitating over 50 houses since 1989.

In order to be eligible, the following guidelines are in effect as of 2010. Income cannot exceed the following amounts per households:

1 person.....	\$57,120
2 person.....	\$65,280
3 person.....	\$73,440
4 person.....	\$81,600


