Just a look at the newspaper headlines tells us that 2008 will be a very difficult economic year for towns in the state of New Jersey as the funds for local government and schools get cut from the state budgets. More than ever before, local spending will need to be monitored closely to minimize the tax impact on our already overburdened Warren residents. As your Mayor working with a Township Committee which feels just as I do, we are committed to keeping our local spending and our taxes as lean as possible.

These times call for a renewed creativity in how we approach local spending and there are some very positive approaches being taken. Our new Recreation Director, Eleanora Hermann, is a welcome addition to our Township and will be responsible for administering our many and varied recreation programs and facilities and I would like to welcome her.

Our Township Committee and I have pledged to continue looking for creative ways of keeping the impact on local taxes minimal through pursuing economies of more shared services, state, federal and private grants and establishing an active and positive relationship with our elected officials at the federal, state and county level.

Summer Program Survey and Camp Information

Based on the survey results recently sent out to the schools, the following program offerings will include but will not be limited to an improved free 5-week summer drop-in camp for children going into Kindergarten to 8th grade, at the municipal pavilion complex. The camp will run from June 30 to Aug. 1 and will be open from 9am to 3pm. Paid camps may include Robotics, Computer Tech Animation, Mad Science, Tennis, Multi-sports, Sport Squirts, Fun Golf and Serious Golf.

Spring Programs

The annual *Fishing Derby* will be held May 10th at Dealaman Nature Trail & Pond (Mount Horeb Road) at 12:00pm. Children under age 11 must be accompanied by an adult. Bring your own pole. Free hot dogs, soda and prizes for ages 5-14.

Spring Tennis Lessons will be held again at Greenwood Meadows beginning May 5 for ages 4 to adult. Nine one hour six-week sessions are being offered with a maximum of 6 participants per instructor. The cost will be \$95 per session. Check the Warren Recreation website (www.warrennj.org/wtrec) for a registration form or pick up a form at the Municipal building.

The American Cancer Society in conjunction with the Recreation Commission will be holding a *Relay for Life* in Warren at the Municipal Complex on June 28 & 29. More information coming soon.

Summer Concerts & Movies

On Thursdays, July 10, 17, 24 & 31 concerts will be held in the Municipal parking lot. We are currently looking for a site to hold the concert if it rains. New bands, side entertainment and refreshments are being planned. On August 7, 14, 21 we will be showing Outdoor Movies also in the municipal complex, movies will be held in the court house if it rains on Aug. 7 & 21.

Focused on Safety

Thanks to the "Janet Zilinski Memorial Fund", six Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) were donated to the Township to be installed on the athletic fields this Spring to ensure a safe environment where youth sports organizations can successfully operate. To go a step further, the Janet Zilinski Memorial Fund has offered free CPR/AED classes to all Warren Township based sports organization coaches. Check the website for dates.

With the help of the Warren Township Sports Organizations, the Recreation Commission is getting close to presenting the J.A.N.E.T Policy (Janet's Always Near Emergency Treatment) which will ensure that youth sports organizations requesting Township of Warren athletic facilities will assign a "Safety Coordinator" for its organization which in turn will work with the Recreation Director to help create and monitor a Safety Committee; hold seasonal parent meetings to discuss organizational emergency procedures; ensure that coaches complete the Rutgers S.A.F.E.T.Y. course; CPR/AED training and assist the Township so that the AED devices are accessible at each athletic site and in proper working condition. Parent's please explain to your child that the AED boxes are not toys to play with and that an alarm will go off if tampered with. The next CPR/AED class is March 29.

The Recreation Commission also strives to be a community resource of information for recreation organizations and sports programs within and

Identity Theft

Identity Theft is a phrase that we hear a lot these days but for those people who have never been personally exposed to it *Identity Theft* can be described as the improper use of a person's personal information or the assumption of someone else's identity to facilitate a theft or other crime.

Each year almost 25 million people, a large portion of which are senior citizens, fall victim to some type of consumer fraud. Estimates show that between 9 and 10 million of these people will be the victim of some type of identity theft. And over fifty percent (50%) of identity theft victims will have their identity stolen by a friend, relative, employee, acquaintance and/or home health care person. All a person needs to assume your identity is your name, birth date and social security number.

How do thieves steal your identity?

- **By phone** – the caller says “I am calling to verify the personal information on your account.” *NEVER provide your personal information to anyone over the phone unless YOU initiated the call.*
- **By computer** – called on-line “Phishing”, you receive a message which requests that you either provide or verify your personal information. *Don't do it!!*
- **Stolen wallets/pocketbooks** – A pickpocket gets your wallet in a crowd, a thief takes your pocketbook from the shopping cart. *Cancel all or your credit cards and charge accounts immediately. Today's thief takes the credit cards, finds your business card and calls you to say that he found your wallet and will mail it to you. You're relieved and do nothing, wrong! You just gave the thief 2 days to have a fake ID made with your name and his picture on it and max out all of your credit cards!*
- **Searching through garbage (dumpster diving)** – *Shred all personal papers before you throw them in the trash.*
- **Credit card skimming** – Thieves swipe your card through a hand held “skimming” device to retrieve your personal information when you provide your card for a transaction. *Don't let your card out of your sight when completing transactions, observe to make sure that your credit card is swiped only once for each transaction you make.*
- **Mailbox thefts** – Thieves sort through your mail looking for bank statements, pre-approved credit card applications and boxes of new checks sent to you by your bank. *Take the mail out of your box daily and pick your new checks up at the bank. To keep pre-approved credit card applications from being mailed to you, sign up for the “Opt Out” program by calling the Consumer Credit Reporting Industry at 1-888-567-8688*

Ways to help keep from being a victim:

- One of the best ways to stay ahead of Identity Theft is to be aware of how very prevalent it is. Be alert for unusual transactions or charges on your accounts. Be mindful that deals offered over the computer or telephone that sound too good to be true, usually are!
- Memorize your Social Security (SS) number and PIN numbers. Do not keep your SS card in your wallet with the rest of your identification. Do not keep “cheat sheets” with your PIN numbers and /or account numbers in your wallet either.
- Keep your wallet free of credit cards that you don't use. Keep photocopies of your cards in a safe place at home so you can refer to them for the information necessary to cancel them if needed.
- Check your credit report periodically. You are entitled to receive 1 free credit check per year from each of the three nationwide consumer credit reporting agencies.

If you do become the victim of Identity Theft, immediately report your findings to the Warren Police Department so we can file a report on your behalf. The prompt filing of a police report may give you specific rights and limit your exposure to the thefts committed against you. You should also contact the Federal Trade Commissions Identity Theft Hotline toll-free at 1-877-ID-THEFT or on line through their website at www.ftc.gov.

Warren Township Volunteer Fire Department

The Fire Department responded to 388 calls in 2007, three of which were major structure fires, and at Green Brooks request we responded to a major house fire in Green Brook. We had a very busy few days last spring during the big storm that dropped so much rain on us, during that time we worked around the clock on over 40 calls for basement flooding. All in all we put in over 475 hours of time responding to calls and attending drills and training.

Please keep in mind the fact that we are 100% Volunteer, we save the taxpayer of Warren approximately 1.8 million dollars a year by not having to pay for a career fire department.

It is my fervent hope that you don't need our services, but if you do I will promise you that we will do all we can to help you in a professional and respectful manor.

What Is In Your Medicine Cabinet?

First, there is good news. Illegal drug abuse has been dropping during the past 20 years. There are many reasons for this drop but think about the following: it is a nasty habit, there is no quality control of the substances, you purchase from unsavory characters, you may have to go to unsafe places, and there is always the possibility that you may earn a police record. The information campaign and the work that you are doing with your children has worked. Fewer kids are smoking cigarettes and using illegal drugs.

However, there is bad news. The use and abuse of legal prescriptions and over the counter drugs has increased measurably. The kids think that: these drugs are already at home, they are prescribed by a doctor so they are considered to be safe, they are made by drug companies so there is quality control, and, in some cases, a friend or a parent is using this drug with no bad effect! The legally obtained drugs can be found when your child is babysitting at the neighbor's house or visiting grandparents. Without a prescription, an industrious drug seeker can use a credit card to order a drug from an online drug store located in a foreign country. They think that "Online" is ok, right! It is delivered by the Post office, so it must be ok, right?

Go look in your medicine cabinet! You might find out that you have some very nasty, out of date, dangerous pain killers. Or, you might find some old Ritalin or other personality management drug! You know, you might find that Triple C you bought the last time that you had a bad cold, or that cough medicine with a DM symbol, or you might find a very large bottle of Ibuprofen or Acetaminophen. All of the previously mentioned "legal" prescriptions and over the counter drugs are present day drugs of choice for our teenagers.

"Legal" drug abusers have been known to crush time-release drugs thereby making them so much more potent when they are ingested. "Bowling parties"--drugs from several different family medicine cabinets are poured into a bowl and kids just take a handful and ingest them with no consideration of the mixture! "Pharm" parties are becoming more popular than parties with liquor. There are no bottles, no illegality, no smell, etc....)

We have recently learned from the death of Heath Ledger that Prescription Drugs can be lethal. Over the counter drugs have caused death as well as serious kidney and liver damage. Empty out that medicine cabinet and put that medicine under lock and key. Count the pills and be aware!

Important 2008 Tax Dates

2nd QTR Property taxes due May 1 - May 10

On or about July 25, 2008, the tax bills for 3rd & 4th QTR 2008 and 1st & 2nd QTR 2009 will be mailed to residents.

Any questions or problems can be addressed by calling or visiting the Tax Collector at the Municipal Building. If you have any questions regarding tax payments contact the Tax Collectors office at (908) 753-8000 x 231 or 232. Any questions regarding tax assessments should be addressed to the Tax Assessors' office x 235.

If you are paying your own taxes, please mail in sufficient time to insure that it is received prior to the end of the grace period. After the 10th of the month, interest is charged at a rate of 8% for the first \$1,500 and 18% thereafter.

HOME REHABILITATION PROGRAM

The Warren Township Committee offers a Housing Rehabilitation Program for residents who meet C.O.A.H. regulations for low and moderate incomes. The program provides up to \$11,000 per dwelling for home improvements such as: new roof, electrical improvements, smoke detectors, etc. The funds are in the form of an interest free loan which is forgiven after a 10 year period. The loan must be repaid only if the property is sold. Interested residents can contact *Rehabco, Inc.*, at (732) 477-7750 of Brick, New Jersey or the Township Administrator's office at extension 252. The Township has been successful in rehabilitating over 45 houses since 1989.

In order to be eligible, the following guidelines are in effect as of 2007. Income cannot exceed the following amounts per households:

1 person.....	\$51,968
2 person.....	\$59,392
3 person.....	\$66,816
4 person.....	\$74,240

The **COMMUNITY GARDEN PROJECT** at the Wagner Farm Arboretum in Warren Township had a highly successful start-up in 2007. Area residents are again invited to register for the community gardening plots at 197 Mountain Ave in Warren. The 10 by 20 foot plots are in full sun and are protected by deer, groundhog and rabbit fencing. The plots may be used for seasonal and perennial plantings. They rent for an annual fee of \$50.00. All the plots cultivated last year have been rented for 2008 and the original plan of 55 plots has now been doubled to accommodate gardeners. Weather permitting; the new garden area will be ready for planting by mid-April. Registration applications may be obtained at www.wfafnj.org or by e-mailing requests to administrator@wfafnj.org.

The **GIVING GARDENERS' PROJECT (GGP)** grows vegetables, dedicated to feed the poor and needy, which will be distributed through agencies such as SHIP, Food Bank Network of Somerset County, Star Fish, Second Harvest, Calvary Chapel Lighthouse Food Pantry, soup kitchens, and other appropriate agencies. The gardens are grown on plots in a portion of the Community Garden and tended entirely by volunteers. The Giving Gardeners' Project and Central School in Warren have joined together to create the **GROWING TO GIVE PROJECT**. This project was developed and created under the guidance of Ernie Cottrill the Director of the Giving Garden at the Wagner Farm Arboretum and Dr. MaryLou Cebula the principal at Central School.

Cheryl Plager's kindergarten class at ALT school will plant a **THREE SISTERS GARDEN**. This American Indian technique, which was used before the arrival of Europeans in North America, mingles corn, pole beans, and squash/pumpkin such that they support each other and replenish the soil without crop rotation. The class will plant the seeds in plots prepared by GGP volunteers and return for pumpkin harvest in the fall. WFA education committee will supply training material and the teacher will relate the program to history and agriculture.

In addition to cultivating organic vegetables and a community of committed gardeners, the **WAGNER FARM ARBORETUM LEARNING CENTER** is offering nourishment to the area residents through classes focused on inner development including: yoga, meditation, and drawing. The classes began in the beginning of March and will continue as long as we have interest. Fifty percent of the class fees will be donated to the Arboretum. ZONING OFFICE

The Township requires permits for all sheds, fences, signs and tree removal. March is Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month Have You Been Screened?

March is National Colorectal Cancer Awareness – the primary goal of which is to increase awareness that colorectal cancer is largely preventable, treatable and beatable. In fact, if everybody aged 50 and older had regular screening tests, nearly 60% of the deaths related to it could be prevented.

Basic Facts

Colorectal cancer is a cancer that occurs in the colon or rectum. Sometimes it is called colon cancer, for short. The colon is the large intestine and the rectum is the passageway that connects the colon to the anus. It affects both men and women of all racial and ethnic groups, and is most often found in people aged 50 years or older. For men, it is the third most common cancer after prostate and lung cancers. For women, it is the third most common cancer after breast and lung cancers. Most importantly, in many cases, **this disease can be prevented.**

Prevention

One of the most powerful weapons in preventing colorectal cancer is regular screening or testing. From the time the first abnormal cells start to grow, it generally takes about 10 to 15 years for them to develop into colorectal cancer. Therefore, regular screenings can, in many cases, prevent the disease altogether. This is because polyps, or growths, can be detected and removed before they have the chance to turn into cancer. Screening can also result in finding colorectal cancer early, when it is highly curable.

People who have no identified risk factors (see box above) other than age should begin regular screening at age 50. Those who have a family history or other risk factors for colorectal cancer polyps or cancer need to talk with their doctor about starting screening at a younger age and more frequent intervals.

According to the American Cancer Society, people can lower their risk of developing colorectal cancer by managing the risk factors that they can control, such as diet and physical activity. It is important to eat plenty of fruits, vegetables, and whole grain foods and to limit intake of high-fat foods. Physical activity is another area that people can control. Most experts recommend at least 30, preferably 45 to 60 minutes of physical activity on 5 or more days of the week.

Risk Factors for Colorectal Cancer

A Risk Factor is anything that increases the chance of getting a certain disease. Speak to your doctor if these apply to you:

- AGE – Risk increases after age 50
- PERSONAL HISTORY of colorectal cancer or polyps
- FAMILY HISTORY of colorectal cancer
- PERSONAL HISTORY of inflammatory Bowel Disease, including ulcerative colitis and Crohn's Disease
- DIETS high in fat, especially fats from animal sources
- PHYSICAL INACTIVITY
- SMOKING
- HEAVY ALCOHOL USE
- DIABETES

Warren Township Sewerage Authority

All sewer service customers are billed twice a year, each having two quarter stubs attached. One bill is issued in January for February and May payments and another bill is sent in June for August and November payments. Bills become delinquent after the 10th of the due date and are subject to an 18 percent annual interest. Bills that carry the previous year's fees are subject to the annual Township tax sale.

- * The Sewerage Authority has not had to raise rates in the past two years.
- * There are three treatment plants located in Warren and 18 pump stations throughout the Township.
- * The Authority has been actively refurbishing/upgrading the aging treatment plants subject to changing DEP regulations. These projects are being funded through bonds that were issued in 2003 and 2006.

A reminder to homeowners that if you have a sewer emergency after regular weekday hours please call the Warren Police Department at 908 753-1000 and they will direct your call. The Authority has on call wastewater treatment operators twenty four hours a day seven days a week.


